## Forthcoming Events Summer 2024

The first event in our programme will be the Cool Heswall event to increase community understanding of climate change. Here the volunteers will have a WCV display and shall be sowing seeds in newspaper pots.



The next event will be an evening event at Rough Shoots Wood, Thingwall Corner weeding the 500 whips the WCV planted two years ago. This essential follow up work will ensure the success of this tree planting project. Hedgerow trees can be highlighted again to prevent their inadvertent trimming. Bring along some tree weeding tools if you have them.

More follow up work will continue at Wood Park Farm Landican weeding the hedge we had recently laid. Volunteers can meet up at Gorston Lane (W3W "handle headliner.seat") which is much closer to the hedge. Bring along to hedge weeding tools. This will be followed by a group meeting at the nearby Hinderton Arms. Do come along and contribute to the group.


June is balsam pulling season. Cover up well and bring some insect repellent. We will also remove the flowering heads of the pendulous sedge which is becoming invasive in the wood. Entrance Coppice can be checked and bramble removed from the coppice area if necessary.

At Poulton Hall Walled Gardens and Parkland there is a charity event. The quirky gardens will be open for viewing and cream teas served. The Volunteers will have a stall and carry out a hedge laying demonstration with a mocked-up willow hedge and tools sharpening. Plenty of other roles are required to make the event happen, contact Paul for details.

There will be a second evening trip to Landican. This time to weed the hedges that we have been laid along the gas works lane.

There is a circular cycle ride to Farndon. This event is a 35miles at a leisurely pace starting at Hooton Station. Bring some refreshments along. We 're taking in a tea shop too!

The next evening event will be sharpening scythe blades for the forthcoming scything season to get off to a good start, along with cultivating some plant cuttings. There is a new mobile peening jig that can be used in the field to try out. Peening is when the blade edge is thinned and hardened by cold hammering the blade thin. Once you have done this you will feel the scythe blade gripping the grass prior to cutting the grass with ease.



With keen edge blades we will start the mowing regime at New Ferry Butterfly Park around the pond in the morning and Charlie's Field in the afternoon.

Path edges will require some attention too. The park being open to the public there will be no parking at the park that day but plenty of free parking nearby.
