

## Forthcoming Events Winter 2021-2022

The traditional Christmas task is at Thornton Common, cutting willow and laying the Eastern hedge. Some oaks will be pollarded and Hawthorn whips will be transplanted into the enclosure hedge. Oak seedlings will be collected for further propagation. Some marsh cinquefoil cuttings from the common will be established in the Eastern pond. There will be a bonfire and baked potatoes both days.



January 2022 starts at the butterfly park clearing areas of brambles and paths along the lime side hedges, so that the Old MacDonald had a Butterfly Park trail tokens can be found and reexposing the lime siding track bed, Hedge laying, tree planting and tree pruning. will also take place. There will be cowslips to be planted in the Charlie's Field as this area is being improved for butterflies by adding more nectar sources.

Coppicing for hedging stakes continues at Heavy Oak Coppice, Thornton Wood. The coppicing will benefit ground flora which includes primroses and wood anemone. In addition, pea sticks, bean poles and other coppice products can be collected.

The 36<sup>th</sup> AGM is a chance to reflect on the group's activities and achievements this year and this will be followed by a slide show. This will be held at Windsor Close Community Centre, Windsor Close, New Ferry, where there is plenty of space for social distancing.

At Eastham Country Park the group will continue with sweet chestnut coppicing for hedging stakes and materials for making a gate hurdle for the entrance to the Brick Pit Coppice at New Ferry Butterfly park.


In February tools can be refreshed and keener edges added with a tool maintenance evening at Philippa and Paul's. Billhooks and axes will be sharpened for the forthcoming events. Some of our billhooks still need a lot of work. The WCV motorised sandstone wheel recently restored by Peter Martin can have the final wheel dressing ie smoothed out.



In February the volunteers will be at Tom's Paddock carrying out hedgelaying on a young hedge that was laid about a decade ago. There will be hazel coppicing of half a dozen stools for hedge stakes as well as bramble removal. Tom's Paddock is a Cheshire Wildlife Trust reserve, noted for its insects and fine display of marsh orchids. Hawthorn whips will be planted on the motorway boundary fence

At the butterfly park we will carry on hedge laying, bramble removal and step back into woodland crafts making a gate hurdle from the sweet chestnut coppiced at Eastham the month before.
